

Resident of the Month Daisy Hughes



Daisy Hughes was born east of Glendo

in 1923. Daisy came from a family of nine. Her mother died before Daisy reached seven years of age. Her father had a bad heart and so it was up to her older brother to support the family. She said "We lived 30 miles from nowhere" and worked hard on the ranch.

She attended school through the tenth grade and then quit.
Daisy did not own a dress or any girls clothing and was embarrassed. All she had to wear her brother's hand me downs.

After leaving school she worked as a babysitter. She took care of three girls during the summer. She was supposed to be paid \$3.00 a week, but was never paid.

When she was seventeen she met her future husband. They were first friends and then married in 1941.

The couple had 8 children.

Their first three children contracted polio. Two of her sons died, one was left crippled by the disease. Daisy and her husband were married 37 years when he died. He was a Veterinarian and was injured on the job. She took him to the hospital. He passed a blood clot and died.

Daisy enjoys helping anyway she can. She likes puzzles and music. She has a special friend, Glen that she likes to sit and visit with.

PLEASE Help to keep our residents healthy

Remember the **number 1** defense against the flu and infection is **hand washing**.

Spring is here! It is time to help the residents prepare for spring and summer. Due to limited space within each resident's room and the necessary requirement for fire and safety, infection control and housecleaning, we ask each resident to limit their personal items as outlined below.

The following is NOT allowed unless approved by the Resident Care Director:

- Empty boxes or suitcases
- Perishable foods more than 2 days old
- Plants that have plant bugs
- Any item that could endanger self or others their safety such as, scissors, knives, screwdrivers, or other sharp instruments unless approved by maintenance or RCD
- Heating pads/blankets, extension cords, mattress pads or appliances.
- Throw rugs
- More than six medium sized stuffed animals are not allowed.

Rotate the seasonal clothing in closets and drawers. Please remove the winter clothes and replace them with spring and summer attire. Remember when bringing in clothing to update the inventory sheet that is on each residents closet door. Be sure to mark the residents clothing clearly with a laundry marker.
